In the example above, there are a couple things that don't look quite right:

- 1. The email is from a non-SWC email address that's always a red flag when receiving these kinds of email. Further, the email address is from a foreign country .cl is from Chile.
- 2. \$500 for 9 hours of work? Too good to be true!

If the person who received this email would've emailed their cellphone number, the person on the other end would've tried to gather personal information, possibly in an attempt to commit identity theft.

Be smart - do not fall for it!
